

CLEAN TEETH CAMPAIGN ON IN DOUGLAS

Douglas, January 26, 1916 – Beginning on Monday January 29, a campaign for clean teeth will start in Douglas, to be known as Douglas Dental Week.

At nine o'clock on the morning of the 29th, Dr. Carter, one of the Douglas dentists, will address the children of the upper grades and the high school upon the subject "Why Clean Teeth Mean Good Health."

The public is cordially invited to attend this assembly. Simultaneously, the same subject will be presented to the children of the lower grades by their teachers. Each child will be then presented with an ample tube of toothpaste donated by Colgate, and different prize contests will be inaugurated in each grade. There will be honor rolls containing the names of those who are brushing their teeth most regularly; daily talks on dental hygiene will be given; and there will be toothbrush drills, essay contests on "Why I Should Take Care of My Teeth," etc.

The various women's clubs of the city will also observe Dental Week, by discussing in their meetings different phases of dental hygiene.

The Douglas newspapers will also cooperate into the movement by printing each day an educational article regarding the care of the teeth, and by publishing the news of the progress the campaign is making.

All three Douglas drugstores have offered to reduce their prices to children for toothbrushes, toothpaste, etc., during Dental Week.

At the Douglas Parent-Teacher Association meeting on Monday, February 5 at eight o'clock, Dr. Carter will make an address on the subject "Deciduous Teeth."

Just after Dental Week, beginning on February 6, Dr. Maule will conduct an examination of the children's teeth in his office, filling out cards in duplicate similar to those being used for the student medical examination. Dr. Maule has offered to do this gratis, and there is no doubt that his generosity will be as much appreciated as that of Dr. Sargeant, Mr. White, Miss Brady, and Miss Roene who have made possible the medical examinations.

Mr. Henry Brie has contributed a prize to be awarded to the child ranking highest in this examination by Dr. Maule. – *Daily Alaska Dispatch*
