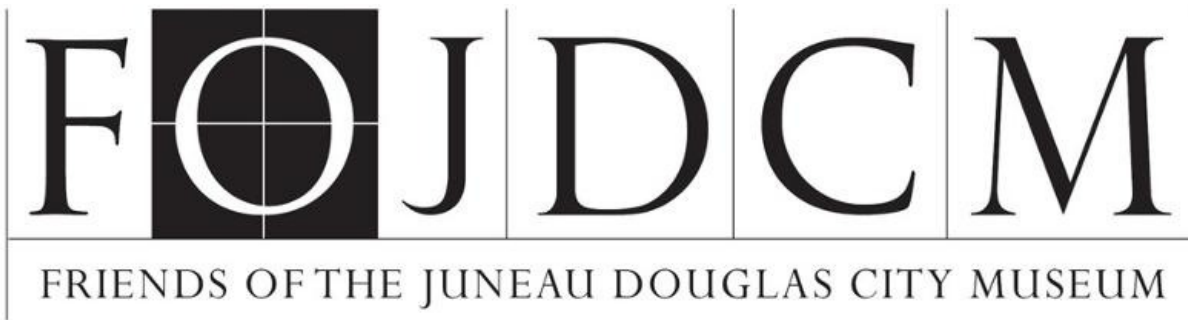
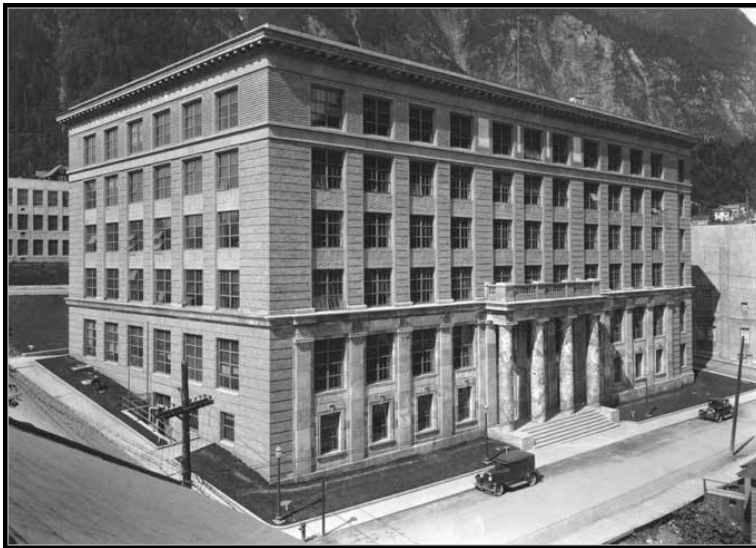

CORNERSTONE WILL BE LAID HERE TUESDAY

Arrangements Made for Dedication Exercises Tomorrow Afternoon

April 23, 1930--The cornerstone for Juneau's new Territorial and Federal building, which will be the largest structure in the city when completed, will be laid tomorrow between 4 and 5 p.m. at the corner of Fourth and Seward streets.

The exercises will be started with a parade forming at the Scottish Rite Temple at 4 p.m. The Juneau City Band will lead the march followed by the Grand Tyler and Grand Stewards of the Masonic lodge; Lodge members; Federal, Territorial, and City officials; the Drum and Bugle Corps of the American Legion; Legion members; school children; construction engineers; and officials of the Grand Lodge.

The parade will march on Fourth Street to Franklin Street, thence to Front, west on Front to Seward, and up Seward to Fourth.

Following the parade, the cornerstone laying will be held, with appropriate ceremonies. Governor George A. Parks will make the official address, completing the program.

On the platform, in addition to Governor Parks, will be Judge Justin W. Harding, Mayor Thomas B. Judson, Harry G. Watson, President of the Chamber of Commerce, Claude Helgeson, Commander of the American Legion, and officials of the Masonic Lodge.

Within the copper box which will be set in the cornerstone will be: The Governor's report of 1929, a list of Federal and Territorial officials, Alaska Legionnaire magazine of March 1930, Chamber of Commerce pamphlets and membership list, roster of city officials, a copy of the Gastineau Elk magazine and roster of members, pamphlets and map of the proposed international highway, and notes by the construction engineer. *Daily Alaska Empire*
